### Criteria for recontextualisation

*Didier Pollefeyt and Jan Bouwens*

- Criterion 1.** Formal movement: text placed in a new context and undergoes a shift of meaning
- Criterion 2.** There is a Catholic religious component
- Criterion 3.** There is a contextual component, referring to present-day culture
- Criterion 4.** There is an interaction resulting in a fusion of Catholic and contextual components
- Criterion 5.** It evokes existential transformation that invites revelation

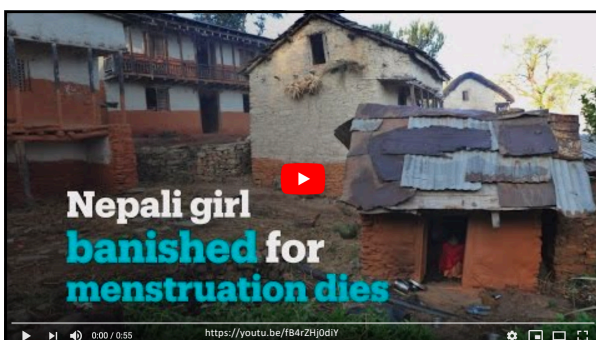

**Luke 8:43-48**

<sup>43</sup> Now there was a woman who had been suffering from hemorrhages for twelve years; and though she had spent all she had on physicians,[I] no one could cure her. <sup>44</sup> She came up behind him and touched the fringe of his clothes, and immediately her hemorrhage stopped. <sup>45</sup> Then Jesus asked, "Who touched me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the crowds surround you and press in on you." <sup>46</sup> But Jesus said, "Someone touched me; for I noticed that power had gone out from me." <sup>47</sup> When the woman saw that she could not remain hidden, she came trembling; and falling down before him, she declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. <sup>48</sup> He said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace."

### Recontextualisation versus "Making it Relevant"

#### Recontextualisation

- The text fuses with the new context and new meaning can be made in multiple ways – it opens up rather than closes down

#### Making it Relevant ("CVE")

- The new context does not add anything to the meaningfulness of the text
- The new context flattens out the meaningfulness of the text, reducing it to a very simple or basic meaning
- The text resists the new context (square peg in a round hole)

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
